School Sponsorship Project



These children in rural Prey Veng are taking their first steps in literacy towards a brighter future

O(WDA) is now up-and-running. Five pre-schools, attended by a total of 96 children, began operation again in April 2012 after lack of funds had temporarily caused their suspension.



I visited one of the schools during my trip to Cambodia last September. Prey Veng is a rural province a few hours' drive from Phnom Penh. It is a very poor region where most of the population is engaged in farming. The schools are very basic and run on a low budget but they are serving the need of getting children into the education system. Most importantly, many of these children are then enrolling in primary schools.

The cost of running these 5 schools was covered last year by our donation of \$3,000. The first instalment of

\$1,500 has been sent for the first half of this current year (April 2013 to March 2014). The rapid depreciation of the yen in recent months against the dollar coupled with disappointing fund-raising results last year has made funding difficult for the coming year and prevented us from expanding the project.

Curriculum

- Khmer consonants: 33
- Khmer vowels: 18
- Khmer and international Numbers: 1-20
- Moral practice on how to respect parents, the elderly, teachers, visitors, other children and good behaviour when sitting, standing, walking, speaking and playing
- Short Khmer poem
- Singing a song
- Observation of actual things such as local fruits and animals
- Hygiene: cutting nails, cleaning hands and face, taking a bath cutting hair, drinking clean water

Most of the children can read and write 60% of Khmer consonants; a few could not read or write smoothly

Most of the children can count and write Khmer and International numbers from 1-20; a few could not count or write smoothly. Moreover, those children could do simple calculation among numbers 1-20 too

All the children could sing the songs about hygiene, morality and respecting parents/elderly

The children come to school every morning Mon to Fri for the 2 1/2 hour classes

The curriculum of the pre-school includes simple sport such as football

31 children age 6 years old have prepared to enter the 1st grade at public primary schools around their villages

Encountered Problems:

- The pre-schools do not have enough tables and chairs for children
- Teaching materials are very limited

Success Story:

- 31 children age 6 have ability to continue their education in the 1st grade of primary school
- Most of the children come to school regularly
- The parents greatly appreciate being able to send their children to school

Suggestion: All the teachers want WDA and donor to display a school sign board in front of each school to let the villagers know about pre-school activities in their villages

On 3 April 2013, \$1,500 (¥144,490) was sent to WDA in Cambodia to cover costs of running the pre-schools in Prey Veng from April to October. More money needs to be raised to cover the cost of the second half of the year.

B esides sponsoring the pre-schools in Cambodia, in the past year we have also assisted Sreinith Ten in her post-graduate studies in the US at the University of Northern Illinois in Chicago. As a scholarship student at the Royal University of Phnom Penh, Sreinith won the first Kobe Shoin Cambodia Speech Contest and visited Japan in December 2010. She was a volunteer at the Documentation Center of Cambodia (DC-Cam), an NPO documenting all materials related to the Khmer Rouge genocide, and after graduating was employed by the Center. Sreinith is now studying for a master's degree in Political Science. Her scholarship in the US covers her tuition but not her living expenses. From special donations last year, we gave Sreinith \$1,000 towards these expenses.
